Community Food Growing in West Lancashire

Final Community Food Growing grants awarded

Congratulations to the local groups who were recently awarded grants from the final round of West Lancs Community Food Growing small grants fund. A total of £5,351 will be shared by five local food growing groups to help them in setting up new food growing projects or to encourage greater community participation and productivity on existing sites. The funding has been provided by NHS Central Lancashire to promote health and well-being. Priority was given to those groups that have not received a CFG grant before. The successful groups were:

- **Liverpool Road Allotment Society:** £450 for fencing repairs and improvements
- **Burscough Allotment Society:** £900 towards the cost of new security fencing, soil improvement, clearing overhanging trees.
- **Appley Bridge Allotment Society:** £990 for soil testing and the creation of new allotments
- **Making Space:** £1411 towards the cost of establishing a new allotment site at the Don Orione Centre in Roby Mill
- **Greenhill Community Centre:** £1600 towards the cost of creating a Community Allotment site with raised beds at the Community Centre in Skelmersdale

In addition, seven schools with existing school food growing clubs were awarded small grants of £50 for start up costs for the coming season.

More Raised Beds for School Allotments

West Lancashire Community Food Growing Project has applied for a small grant which if it is successful in securing, will enable it to provide a further seven primary schools in the West Lancashire area with raised beds for the growing of fruit and vegetables—together with a training package on running a school food growing / gardening club.

To be eligible, schools must be in the West Lancashire Borough Council area and currently have no facilities for the growing of fruit and vegetables. They must have a suitable site on which up to three raised beds can be sited and in a location fully and safely accessible to children. They will need to demonstrate that they have a committed member of staff to receive the training and manage the allotment and organise volunteers to help with the allotment and assist at the start of the project in the transfer of materials (timber and top soil) from the drop off area to where the raised beds are to be sited. If funding for this project is confirmed, we will need to move quickly to get the raised beds in place and crops planted before the end of April if at all possible—to ensure a harvest before the end July. We therefore may need to gain access to the school over the Easter holiday to have the raised beds installed.

Interested schools are requested to complete and return an emailed expression of interest form no later than 19th March 2012. The first seven schools to submit eligible applications and who meet the criteria will be accepted and provided with the raised beds and the training programme.

Free Trees to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee

Celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, have fun and create a lasting legacy for your community or school by planting a free pack of trees from the Woodland Trust in 2012.

Community Groups can apply for a pack of either 105 or 420 trees in four different themes: wildlife, year-round colour, wood fuel or wild harvest. The only proviso is that the trees must be planted on land that everyone in your area can enjoy and benefit from (not private gardens or land with no public benefit). Schools and youth groups can apply for a hedge or copse pack, each containing 60 trees, to plant in their grounds.

News from Allotment Regeneration Initiative: A new national organisation is being developed to act as a realistic response to the intense demand for community growing spaces. The concept of a Community Land Advisory Service (CLAS) is simple: to make more land available, and to facilitate access to that land, for use by community gardening and food growing groups across the UK. The service will act as a trusted intermediary and broker between landowners and community groups and will complement, support and enhance existing local and regional initiatives. During its three-year development stage it will be project managed by the Federation of City Farms and Community Gardens.
