Chair's Report

We continue to offer our support to voluntary, community and faith-based organisations across West Lancashire, alongside the growing number of social enterprises in our Borough, whilst they in turn provide essential support to our residents in increasingly challenging times. These organisations have never been needed more but they also are under tremendous pressure, dealing with increased demand and decreasing resources whilst still recovering from the impact of Covid.

These pressures have also had their toll on our own organisation. Our staff and volunteers continue to give their all under difficult circumstances and work hard to make a positive difference to the lives of residents across West Lancashire. The Trustees are grateful for their commitment, and we value and respect the energy and expertise they apply daily to the challenging work they do. We lost a lot of our Board during this year, as long-standing members reached the end of their time with us, and we pay tribute to their hard work and the care they have shown for the people of our Borough over many years.

Whilst these challenges are difficult, we have much to be positive about too. We had the honour of working alongside a number of key agencies working towards the sustainability of the Ecumenical Centre in Skelmersdale as one of the many key VCFS and community assets. This partnership work has developed exciting plans which will see this much needed resource blossom in the future. In fact, we have recently discussed the potential for West Lancashire Council Voluntary Service (WLCVS) base of operations to move into the 'Eccy' to cement the partnership and are excited to get stuck into developing a new programme of delivery out of the centre. We're also looking forward to welcoming some new trustees in the coming months which will refresh our strategy and secure our position as the key support to organisations with social purpose in our Borough.

Finally, we thank our partners and funders who continue to provide the resources we need to make all this happen. Without them, nothing we do would be possible.

Chief Officer's Report

My first thoughts when reflecting on the last 12 months are of gratitude and privilege. Gratitude to every one of our volunteers, staff, trustees, member organisations, public sector partners and to our funders, all of whom support the work of West Lancs CVS. I also feel privileged to see at first hand the vital work of the VCFSE community in West Lancs and its year-on-year response to the challenges faced by our community.

This past year West Lancs CVS, alongside all our VCFSE organisation's have faced growing community needs around health, poverty, and the longer-term impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite the sector's growing challenges and also national, local and evidenced acknowledgement of the sectors vital role, a long-term funding settlement for the VCFSE sector has still not been forthcoming. In the coming year West Lancs CVS with our peer VCFSE partners will continue to lobby towards a long-term funding solution for the sector, for both infrastructure support and frontline delivery of local VCFSE services.

In the coming year, despite funding and resource pressures, we look forward with the West Lancs VCFSE sectors determination to providing our services supporting volunteering, assisting fund raising, representation and fostering inter-sector partnerships to help to grow the capacity of the sector to support the most vulnerable members of our community.

The trustees are pleased to present their annual report for the year ended 30th March 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published (FRS 102) (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1st January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The object of the Council for Voluntary Service West Lancashire is:

"To promote any charitable purposes for the benefit of the community in the local District of West Lancashire (the area of benefit), and in particular, the advancement of education, the protection of health and the relief of poverty, distress and sickness, and in furtherance of the said purposes, but not further or otherwise, to promote and organise co-operation in the achievement of the same and to that end bring together in council, representatives of the voluntary organisations and statutory authorities within the area of benefit."

The aim of the charitable organisation is to promote voluntary action in the West Lancashire Borough and to act as a democratic body for the local voluntary and community sector, which is accountable to the local VCFSE. There are five key themes to its work.

- The provision of services
- The development of voluntary and community organisations
- Liaison between these organisations
- Representation of these organisation with statutory and other bodies
- · Working in partnership

The Trustees have some key objectives to assist the charitable organisation in the fulfilment of its objectives. These are: -

- Sustaining and managing a fully accessible virtual voluntary sector Resource Centre in the Borough.
- Ensuring that the voluntary and community sector voice is heard and consulted on changes and developments in public sector provision, community economic development and urban and rural regeneration initiatives in the Borough.
- Improved services to voluntary and community organisations to deliver the company object.

VOLUNTEERS

The Council for Voluntary Service West Lancashire is supported by volunteers, who help the charity to meet its objectives and to carry out its activities. Volunteers are supported by staff, with training, meetings and discussions held locally. Our thanks as always are given to all our volunteers who so freely give their time to enhance the work of the Council for Voluntary Service West Lancashire.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

In considering the objectives and activities, the Trustees have considered the Charity Commissions' guidance on Public Benefit to ensure that the organisation is meeting its Public Benefit requirements.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

2021/22 saw WLCVS, and the voluntary sector as a whole facing continued financial challenges in maintaining core services at the same time as responding to the long term and continuing impact of COVID-19. This continues to create a major increase in the workload of WLCVS in all its core services. Despite the finance and staff resource challenges WLCVS continued to provide its VCFSE capacity building services. The past year has also seen the beginning of major structural and governance changes within the health and care public sector bodies and WLCVS has ensured a presence on behalf of the West Lancs VCFSE community for representation and feedback to champion the vital role of the charitable sector in the emergent new structures.

Notable examples of this are:

- Partnership development and founding membership of the Lancs & South Cumbria VCFSE Alliance to ensure the voice, influence and participation of the West Lancs VCFSE in the emergent new structures.
- Being a proactive partner in the multi-sector West Lancs Partnership as a representative for the VCFSE sector, helping to identify the priorities and partnership solutions to improve the health and wellbeing of the West Lancs community.
- West Lancashire Social Prescribing Service continued to work in partnership with the West Lancs GP federation to provide the opportunity for any West Lancs resident to be referred into it by their GP. The social prescribing service is offered across the whole borough providing person-centered assessment and planned support as per the individual level of patient support needed.
- The CVS worked with national, regional and local funders and commissioners to bring in essential VCFSE funds in West Lancashire and maintained work with existing funders e.g., the Eric Wright Charitable Trust. WLCVS continued to work with the Trust to deliver grants of up to £500 to small, mainly volunteer led, voluntary & community groups and small charities (with an income of less than £30,000 per year) across West Lancashire.
- Work continued to ensure the VCFSE sector has investment (grants and contracts) from West Lancs health commissioners (CCG) and benefit from a continuing investment of £100,000 a year to the local sector to develop its capacity and essential role in improving the health & wellbeing of the community.
- Bringing together the West Lancs VCFSE and public sector bodies to ensure that the sector has voice and influence around the emergent changes to the public sector structures.
- Continuing the provision of a nationally accredited West Lancs Volunteer Centre providing support to both VCFSE organisations and individual community volunteers across West Lancashire.
- Providing a generic VCFSE communication network for VCFSE Information, and funding advice service for organisations across West Lancashire.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income in the year was £754,812 (2021: £640,847) of which £166,266 (2021: £166,266) related to funding for projects upon which restrictions are placed.

Total expenditure in the year was £565,728 (2021: £543,817), leaving a surplus for the year of £189,084 (2021: surplus £97,030).

At 30th March 2022 the charitable company's reserves stood at £482,221 (2021: £293,137) of which £240,861 (2021: £91,970) represented restricted funds.

Risk Management

The Trustees have examined the major strategic, business, and operational risks which the charitable company may face and believe that all major risks have been identified. The Trustees have adopted a formal 'Risk Assessment' procedure and have established systems to ensure that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

Reserves Policy

It is the policy of the charitable company to maintain unrestricted funds, which are free reserves at a level to cover redundancy provision, and three months' running costs should no further funding be received.

As at the end of the financial year the unrestricted funds totalled £241,360. The charitable company requires £50,263 for redundancy provision, £65,449 for three months' running costs (total £115,712).

The trustees plan to use some of the unrestricted reserves balance to develop and support the Charity's core activity funding themselves staff salaries in 2022/23, including the move to and development of a new office base for the team.

Investment Policies

Under the Memorandum of Articles of Association, the charitable company has the power to make any investment, using the unrestricted general funds, which the Trustees see fit.

PLANS FOR FUTURE

The coming year for WLCVS and the local VCFSE sector will be a very challenging time. From the increasing support needs of our community due to the long-term impact of Covid-19 and the economic drivers which are leading to increases in poverty. These issues will continue to increase the requests for support from both the hard-pressed community and public sector bodies looking to the VCFSE sector as part of the solution. Despite this increase in the sector's workload, the lack of longer-term funding solutions which also take account of the core running costs of charitable organisations will lead to further sustainability issues for the sector. Many organisations, like WLCVS have had to use reserves to continue essential service delivery. Sustainability therefore will be a major concern going forward in the coming year.

WLCVS are committed to continuing our local infrastructure support for the West Lancs VCFSE sector in the coming year. This will focus on volunteering, fund raising, capacity building, and central to this will be our partnership working with our member organisations as well as working in partnership with local, regional, and national bodies to support the VCFSE community. WLCVS will continue to run and develop the West Lancs Social Prescribing service with its stakeholders ensuring that this support service is available to vulnerable patients across the borough.

WLCVS will continue their links with key Lancashire wide VCFSE bodies e.g., Lancashire Association of CVSs (LACVS), The Lancs & South Cumbria VCFSE Alliance (L&SC Alliance), regionally with Voluntary Sector North West (VSNW) as well as national VCFSE co-ordinating bodies. This will ensure West Lancs groups and organisations are fully represented in the wider developments of the VCFSE sector.

WLCVS will continue to work to understand the benefits of developing digital tools which support, enhance, and increase the efficiency of running VCFSE services.

In the coming year we will be researching and producing a digital solution for a VCFSE Directory of Service covering West Lancs. We will also aim to explore the options for an online Volunteering portal to help both members of the community take up volunteering opportunities as well as VCFSE organisations recruit and support their own volunteers.

WLCVS will continue its work around the health and wellbeing of the community through its health and wellbeing network. We will continue to encourage a focus on the wider determinants of health and with the multi-sector West Lancashire Partnership, solutions around reducing the level of health inequality across the borough.

WLCVS will continue work on behalf of its VCFSE membership to represent their views to key partners. We will aim to bring together commissioners, including the local authority, health commissioners and providers to encourage VCFSE investment through grants and contracts.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organisation is a charitable company, limited by guarantee registered in England and Wales, (company number 02940823) and was incorporated on 20th June 1994 and registered as a charity (charity number 1039563) on 19th July 1994.

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the company and is governed by its Articles of Association.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

Governing Document

The company is governed by its Memorandum of Articles of Association dated 27th May 1994 and is constituted as a company limited by guarantee.

Directors and Trustees

The directors of the charitable company are its Trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as Trustees.

Trustees who served during the year and up to the date of this report are detailed on page 8 under Reference and Administrative Details

Appointment of Trustees, Membership and Board Functioning

The Council for Voluntary Service West Lancashire is a membership organisation, the members being constituted of local, voluntary and community groups and individuals interested in furthering the objects of the charity.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for setting the strategic direction of the organisation. In accordance with the Memorandum and Articles of Association for Council for Voluntary Service West Lancashire, Trustees are elected at the Annual General Meeting. There is no maximum to the numbers of Trustees, but the minimum is set at three with one-third standing down each year. This provides a balance between continuity and experience and the opportunity for committed members being able to put themselves forward for election to join the board. Those standing down may put themselves forward for re-election.

To stand as a Trustee, the applicant must be approved member of the charity and elected by the membership at the AGM. There are presently over three-hundred-member organisations or individual members and each of these has a vote at the Annual General Meeting. They may also need their organisation's approval to stand for election depending on the rules of their nominating body.

Meetings of the Board of Trustees are held approximately every two months or as required due to the work needed at any point in time.

At the beginning of every meeting all Trustees are reminded of their obligation to declare an interest in any item and, if necessary, withdraw from further discussion and decision making on that subject.

All Trustees are asked to sign to confirm their eligibility to serve as a Trustee and as a Director.

Trustee Training

Trustees are introduced to the function, work and staff of the Council for Voluntary Service West Lancashire when they take up their role.

Trustees are also invited to take up further training opportunities e.g. safeguarding and may recommend courses that they have seen advertised or which other Trustees or members of staff have identified and brought to their attention.

Course fees, travel costs and other out-of-pocket expense may be claimed by Trustees for attendance at courses approved by the Board of Trustees.

Staff and Trustees aim to have at least one 'Away Day' together each year to take a strategic overview of the organisation and its activities and to agree the future direction, then documented in a yearly Business Plan.

Organisational Structure

The Board has the power to create sub-committees, although no specific sub-committees are specified in the governing documents. There is no standing committee, but the Board has the authority to delegate decision-making to a group compromising a minimum of the Chair and Chief Officer, but often a second Trustee will be included in the group.

The Chief Officer and Team and Operations Manager (or Finance Officer) are in attendance at all Trustee Board meetings but may be asked to leave any time during a meeting and do not have a vote.

Day-to-day management of the service is delegated to the Chief Officer. The Senior Management team compromises the Chief Officer and Operations Manager.

There is a comprehensive staff manual compromising a wide range of policies and procedures, for example, Equality and Diversity and Health and Safety and all of these are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

1. Limited Liability

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. Each member's liability is limited to £1.

2. Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published (FRS 102) (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1st January 2019) and Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charitable company has adequate reserves to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The Trustees are confident that the levels of liquidity and free reserves will not affect the charity's operations. Thus, the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are the charity's free reserves available for the trustees to apply in accordance with the charitable company's charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific restrictive conditions imposed by the donor. All restricted funds are accounted for as restricted income and expenditure for the purposes is charged to the fund.

Income recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, there is sufficient certainty of receipt and so it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations and legacies comprise of donations and general grants which are recognised in the accounts when received, with the exception of known legacies which are accounted for when their receipt is certain.

Income from charitable activities is recognised on an accruals basis except for grants receivable, which are recognised on the date on which their unconditional payment is confirmed by the donor.

Income from investment relates to bank interest received and is recognised when the amount is certain.

Expenditure recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charitable company to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual's basis. All expenses, including support costs and governance costs, are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings in the Statement of Financial Activities. Support and governance costs are applied to unrestricted funds unless specifically included in the restrictions, as specified by the donor.

Expenditure on charitable activities relates to the operation of the charity comprising of direct charitable expenditure to meet the objectives of the charitable company. Support and governance costs relate to the management and operation of the organisation and also compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements in producing the annual report. These are dealt with in the Statement of Financial Activities when payment has been approved by the charitable company.

Fixed Assets

Capital expenditure of £2,500 and above is stated in the balance sheet at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life as below:

Computer Equipment

3 years on a straight-line basis

Fixtures & Fittings

4 years on a straight-line basis

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments. Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

Taxation

Income and gains are exempt from taxation as they are received and applied for charitable purposes only. The charitable company benefits from various exemptions from taxation afforded by tax legislation and is not liable to corporation tax on income or gains falling within those exemptions.

Pension

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity in independently administered funds.

Contribution payments are charged to the SOFA. Any amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the balance sheet

Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when there is a clear decision or commitment to terminate the employment or provide such termination benefits.

Leases

Payments made under operating leases, including any lease incentives received, are charges to profit or loss on a straight line basis over the term of the relevant lease except where another more systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leases asset are consumed

Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

3. Trading Subsidiary

The wholly owned subsidiary, WLCVS Limited, which is incorporated in the United Kingdom and is a company limited by guarantee, donates its profits to the charitable company. WLCVS Limited was established to engage in the promotion and support of activities in the voluntary sector and serves the whole of the United Kingdom. The appointment of Officers of WLCVS Limited rests solely with the charitable company, which has absolute authority in this regard. The trading subsidiary was dormant throughout the current and prior years and it was dissolved on 6th July 2021.

Description of Funds

These are monies given to the Charity to be spent at the discretion of the Trustees for specific charitable purposes, as follows:

Beacon Practice Community Fund - A discreet fund credited to the CVS, which started in April 2016 for distribution to West Lancs Charities, Social Enterprises and existing or developing community groups who are focussed on supporting the health of the local community.

Big Lottery Fund Grant – Awards for All - Contribution towards 'Skelmersdale International' project.

DEFRA Emergency Assistance Grant - A joint project with WLBC to work in partnership with WLCVS member organisations to support local communities in crisis due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

European Social Fund- Strengthening Communities through Volunteering - Contribution towards salary costs and core costs.

Eric Wright Charitable Trust Fund - Aimed at helping small, mainly volunteer led, voluntary & community groups, small charities (with an income of less than £30,000 per year) and other not for profit organisations by providing grants of up to £500 for projects that support the following priorities: the elderly, health, education and training, carers and youth.

Groundwork - Tawd Valley Masterplan Project - West Lancs CVS working in partnership with Groundwork CLM to consult with the Skelmersdale community and gather the views of residents and other stakeholders in order to create a masterplan and proposal for the development of the Tawd Valley as a recreational space.

Lancashire Association of Councils for Voluntary Service - Funds to support and coordinate the delivery of ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) lessons for families from the Lancashire Refugee Resettlement Programme.

Shopmobility Small Local Groups - Administration of a discrete pot of funding for disbursement to small groups in West Lancashire.

Skelmersdale Arts Network - To develop a visual arts network for Skelmersdale, have a second art exhibition and possible visits to Northwest galleries and to run a 10 week art course.

Sir Douglas Glover Grants - Funding to provide grants to individuals to enable them to access training, employment or other development opportunities.

Tanhouse Health Assets Project - Funding from Lancashire County Council to support the development of an arts project to record the detail of the mapping work in Tanhouse.

VCS Emergencies Partnership - Contribution towards core costs

West Lancashire Borough Council - Contribution towards salary & Core costs

West Lancashire Borough Council - Ageing Well Partnership - Funding to support this thematic group of the One West Lancashire strategic partnership (formerly West Lancs LSP).

West Lancashire Borough Council (Community Champions) - Contributions towards small grant programme

West Lancashire CCG Communications Support - Funded by NHS West Lancashire CCG, West Lancs CVS provides online communication support for "Well Skelmersdale" through social media management and provision of blog content.

West Lancashire Dementia - A local fund to support local residents living with dementia, their carers and family including, awareness campaigns, education and practical support enabling them to live longer and safely in the comfort of their own homes.
