School children from all over West Lancashire celebrated their growing achievements recently at our 'Show What You Grow' 2016 festival of school gardening. Over 65 green fingered children from 10 schools brought school grown produce, homemade scarecrows and displays of drawings, paintings and photos of their gardening work to the event at West Lancashire College on 13th July.

The Mayor of West Lancashire Liz Savage opened the day and the children then enthusiastically took part in activities such as making a Veggie Creature, an Allotment Quiz, and a Grow Your Own activity book. After lunch, the children took to the stage to give presentations about their gardening clubs and the day ended with prize giving.

The event was organised by the Community Food Growing Project in conjunction with West Lancs Allotment Federation and West Lancashire College, and was funded by Upholland Tawd Vale Lions.

Tawd Valley Allotment site now open



Following our report in the last Dig In, we are delighted to report that work is complete on the new allotment site in Ashurst, Skelmersdale and the site is now open! The 34 plot site has been funded by West Lancashire Borough Council and is being managed by nearby Skelmersdale Horticultural Society.

Allocation of plots has started and some ploholders have already started work. Plots are being offered to anyone on existing waiting lists in Skelmersdale (i.e on the waiting lists for Skelmersdale Horticultural Society, Liverpool Road Allotment Society and DIGAS) and then to other applicants in the Skelmersdale area. Organic Veg Club started 3 years ago on an 18 acre site between Burscough and Rufford, with the aim of growing food sustainably and running a local Veg Box scheme. After two growing seasons they now have a community of fifty members from varied backgrounds who want to produce their own food. They also introduced chickens and bees and have an orchard of fruit trees, soft fruit and nut trees. In 2016, Organic Veg Club registered as a Community Interest Company (CIC) and became Burscough Community Farm. They are especially keen to recruit new members this year and there are two types of membership - with or without a Veg Box: <http://burscoughcommunityfarm.org/join-us/>

From Neil's blog:

Veg Boxes: Despite the whole farm being underwater for most of January following the December floods, the site has recovered so quickly that we were able to start our Veg Box business again in June. We are doing three sizes of veg box this year priced at £5.50 for a small (one person), £7.50 for a medium (two person) or £12.50 for a large (four person). Delivery within a five-mile radius is £1.50.

Slow Bicycling: Long before I became an organic veg grower, I had another eco-passion; cycling. 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Active West Lancs

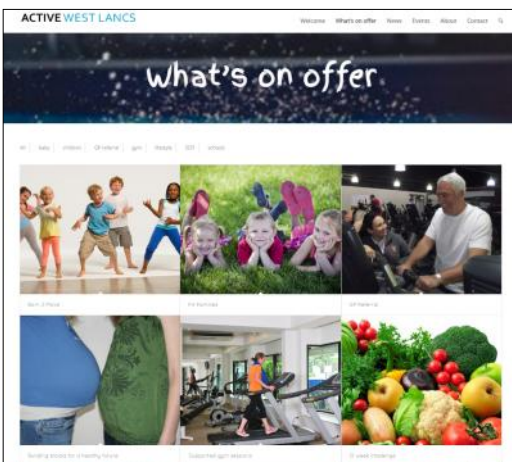


The CVS Community Food Growing project is now part of the Active West Lancs programme and is funded for another 3 years.
